OLD BUSINESS AGENDA ITEM NO. 1

Ordinance to Amend Ch. 11, Conditional Uses, of the Paris Municipal Code as it Relates to the Sale, Storage or Recapping of Tires (Second Reading)

In the past, over many years, the City of Paris has struggled with the accumulation of tires in business, industrial and even residential settings. This accumulation is not only unsightly but a health hazard as well. In an effort to address any existing or future issues the Planning Commission was asked to look at the only requirements we currently have relating to tires in our Zoning Ordinance which is found under Conditional Uses. The Planning Commission reviewed this topic at its May and June meetings, along with recommendations from staff.

After consideration and discussion the Planning Commission is recommending the following ordinance be adopted. This ordinance will change 11-105 Table 1, 11-502. C., 11-602. B., 11-603. B., 11-604. B. and 11-907 of the Paris Municipal Code by expanding the "tire recapping" category to also include "sale and storage" of tires. Additionally, it will allow for the outside storage of tires but limit the number to 10.

Ordinance No. 1273

AN ORDINANCE

to Amend 11-105 Table 1, 11-502. C., 11-602. B., 11-603. B., 11-604. B. and 11-907 of the Paris Municipal Code

SECTION 1. Be it ordained by the Board of Commissioners of the City of Paris, Tennessee as follows:

- A. That 11-105 Table 1 be amended by deleting the Uses Permitted categories "tire recapping" and "tire recapping or retreading" in **REPAIR SERVICES** section of Table 1 and creating the Uses Permitted category "Sale, Storage, or Recapping of Tires" in the **BUSINESS SERVICES** section of Table 1. (Ord. # 1273, 08 / 12 / 21).
- B. That 11-105 Table 1 be amended by allowing "Sale, Storage, or Recapping of Tires" as a Conditional Use in B-1 and as a Use Permitted by Right in M-1, M-2, and P-M. (Ord. # 1273, 08 / 12 / 21).
- C. That 11-502. C. be amended by adding "Sale, Storage, or Recapping of Tires" as a Conditional Use in B-1 Zones. (Ord. # 1273, 08 / 12 / 21).
- D. That 11-602. B., 11-603. B. and 11-604. B. be amended by allowing "Sale, Storage, or Recapping of Tires" as a Use Permitted by Right in M-1, M-2, and P-M Industrial Districts (Ord. # 1273, 08 / 12 / 21).
- E. That 11-907 of the Paris Municipal Code be deleted in its entirety and the following substituted therefore:

11-907. Sale, Storage, or Recapping of Tires.

- A. The sale or storage of new or used tires or the sale, storage, or recapping of tires should be compatible with other uses on the adjacent or surrounding properties.
- B. All applicable State and Federal Standards must be met.
- C. All operations shall be conducted entirely within an enclosed building.

- D. No more than ten (10) tires, at a time, new or used, shall be displayed for sale outside the building.
- E. Outside storage of any scrap rubber or waste materials shall not be permitted.
- F. Temporary storage of used tires that are held for disposal in the ordinary course of business is allowed so long as such storage is in the rear of the business premises in an area not visible to the public.

(Ord. # <u>1273</u>, <u>08 / 12 / 21</u>).

SECTION 2. All ordinances and parts of ordinances in conflict with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

OLD BUSINESS AGENDA ITEM NO. 2

Ordinance to Amend Title 11 of the Paris Municipal Code Relating to As-Built Site Plan Requirements (Second Reading)

A site plan is created by a licensed engineer. This would include any improvements such as parking, existing or proposed utilities, drainage and any drainage features. Prior to the city accepting the improvements as constructed, it must be inspected, approved, disapproved or changes made prior to final acceptance.

In the past this was left to staff from the City, particularly with regard to the drainage features such as detention ponds, grades, etc. Staff may not have the expertise or equipment to offer good judgement on the final product.

The Planning Commission is recommending adding a requirement to the site plan process to require the developer to provide an as built approval from the designing engineer that would certify any drainage, grading or drainage features to insure that the work was completed according to the design.

Any costs related to this process would be the responsibility of the developer. The recommendation only includes drainage since that has always been an issue and continues to plague the City. An as-built drawing for the entire development would be costly for the developer, therefore, our only recommendation is for drainage, and anything related.

Ordinance No. 1274

AN ORDINANCE to Enact 11-1105 of the Paris Municipal Code

SECTION 1. Be it ordained by the Board of Commissioners of the City of Paris, Tennessee that the following be enacted as 11-1105 of the Paris Municipal Code:

11-1105. As Built Site Plans.

- A. <u>Intent.</u> In order to ensure that Site Plans are followed in accordance with City Regulations and in compliance with the approved Site Plan, As Built Drawings containing the following information are required for all Site Plans approved pursuant to 11-1101 *et seq.*
- B. Contents of As Built Site Plan. The As Built Site Plan shall show the following storm drainage features:
 - 1. Manholes/Catch Basins Locations, types, sizes and rim/invert elevations.
 - 2. Storm Lines Locations, lengths, slopes, sizes and materials (abandoned lines should also be shown).
 - 3. Public & Private Utility Easements Locations and widths.
 - 4. Water Quality Facilities (swale length/slope, infiltration galleries, etc.).
 - 5. Low Impact Development Facilities (pervious pavement locations, rain garden details, etc.).
 - 6. Topographic information pertinent to the on-site drainage system, such as ditches, swales, lakes, canals, etc. that are deemed necessary by the City to verify the functional performance of the storm water system shall be noted.
 - 7. Retention/Detention Systems Volume of storage provided, Storage elevation, Overflow elevation and location, Discharge control orifice size, Roof drain connections, Bypass area (Emergency overflow), etc.
 - 8. Stabilization/erosion control.
 - 9. All storm drainage retention/detention systems shall include the following statement: "The storm drainage retention/detention system has been constructed in conformance with the approved plans and is functioning as designed."

C. Construction Record Drawing Requirements.

1. <u>Intent.</u> The following Construction Record Drawing requirements are intended to provide a minimum guide to the surveyor, engineer of record, and construction supervisors and should be used along with good engineering practices as the type of project and situation warrants. These requirements should complement, but do not supersede any other City construction/plan requirements. The City of Paris requires construction record documentation before project closeout and acceptance. Developers, engineers and contractors need to be aware of these requirements in order to satisfy this documentation requirement.

Good on-site records must be maintained to ensure accuracy. Upon completion of the project, the Site Plans approved by the City of Paris are to be corrected to accurately reflect all as-built conditions and shall be submitted by the developer or the Tennessee Registered Professional Engineer that prepared them to: City of Paris, 100 North Caldwell, Paris, TN 38242.

2. <u>As Built Site Plan Format.</u> The As Built Site Plan will be both in the form of a 22 inch by 34 inch (22"x 34") printed copy and electronic clean set of plans, upon which the Contractor shall note any additions and deletions of work. The Contractor shall use red colored pencil to mark all work not shown on the original Site Plans and green colored pencil for deleting any work from the original Site Plans.

The Contractor shall also indicate all deviations in location and elevation of improvements as shown on the Site Plans. As Built Site Plans will be reviewed for accuracy and completeness by the reviewing engineer. If the as-built information is found deficient, it shall be corrected by the Contractor and resubmitted to the City for review and approval.

D. <u>As Built Site Plans required for all Site Plans.</u> As Built Site Plans are required for all projects for which a Site Plan is approved pursuant to this chapter even if there are no deviations from the original approved Site Plan. (Ord. # 1274, 08 / 12 / 21).

SECTION 2. All ordinances and parts of ordinances in conflict with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

SECTION 3. This ordinance shall take effect on and after final passage and adoption.

OLD BUSINESS AGENDA ITEM NO. 3 Ordinance to Prohibit the Use of Tobacco / Vapor Products (Second Reading)

In the most recent legislative session T.C.A. 39-17-1551 (e) was amended to allow municipalities to prohibit by ordinance the use of tobacco and/or vapor products on the grounds of any public park, public playground, public greenway, or any public property that is accessible to use by youth that is owned or controlled by a municipality. We have had requests for several years to prohibit smoking and tobacco use at our parks. This new legislation now gives us the ability to adopt and enforce the following ordinance which is presented for your consideration.

Ordinance No.1275

AN ORDINANCE to Enact 10-201 of the Paris Municipal Code

SECTION 1. Be it ordained by the Board of Commissioners of the City of Paris, Tennessee that 10-201 of the Paris Municipal Code be enacted as follows:

- 10-201. **Prohibition of Use of Tobacco/Vapor Products.** Pursuant to the provisions of T.C.A. 39-17-1551 (e) the use of tobacco products or vapor products, or both, is prohibited on the grounds of any public park, public playground, public greenway, or any public property that is accessible to use by youth that is owned or controlled by the City of Paris. The City of Paris adopts, and incorporates by reference, the applicable provisions of T.C.A. 39-17-1551 (e) for the purposes of interpretation and enforcement of the provisions of this section. (Ord. # 1275, 08 / 12 / 21).
- SECTION 2. All ordinances and parts of ordinances in conflict with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

SECTION 3. This ordinance shall take effect on and after final passage and adoption.

NEW BUSINESS AGENDA ITEM NO. 3 Ordinance to Enact 8-803 E (4) Regarding Grass Clippings (First Reading)

In the past, as sort of a public service announcement, the City has requested on our social media that residents not blow grass onto the city streets. It is unsightly but more important it is extremely dangerous for motorcycles if they encounter this situation. Putting this out into the public has caused quite a stir and there has been a lot of conversation about the topic. It has also become one of those things about which the public is vocal and questions why the City doesn't do anything to keep it from happening.

The City does vaguely cover this scenario in Title 12, Chapter 2 "Miscellaneous Street and Sidewalk Provisions", but staff thought it appropriate to include something more specific in the location where nuisances are addressed. The City Attorney has prepared an ordinance for your review that would add language in Title 8, Chapter 8, "Junk, Weeds, Misc. Nuisances", of the Municipal Code. The ordinance would prohibit the discharge of any soil, sand, mud, gravel, dirt, grass clippings, weeds, leaves, limbs, or any other such mineral or vegetation waste. In addition to specifically addressing grass clippings, this expanded language could actually be of assistance in other scenarios as well. The following ordinance is presented for your consideration.

Ordinance No. 1276

AN ORDINANCE to Enact 8-803 E (4) of the Paris Municipal Code

SECTION 1. Be it ordained by the Board of Commissioners of the City of Paris, Tennessee that 8-803 of the Paris Municipal Code be amended by enacting the following as 8-803 E (4):

8-803 E (4): No owner, tenant, or occupier of any real property located within the corporate limits of the City of Paris nor any agent, servant, or employee of such owner, tenant, or occupier shall place, throw, deposit, or discharge any soil, sand, mud, gravel, dirt, grass clippings, weeds, leaves, limbs, or any other such mineral or vegetation waste from said real property onto any of the streets, gutters, or storm drains within the corporate limits of the City of Paris. (Ord. # 1276, _____/ ___/ 21).

SECTION 2. All ordinances and parts of ordinances in conflict with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

SECTION 3. This ordinance shall take effect on and after final passage and adoption.

NEW BUSINESS AGENDA ITEM NO. 4 Request for Driveway Access Easement Approval

Attorney William Looney's office, on behalf of their client, has submitted a request to the City for a driveway access easement for property located off the Greenwood Cemetery Road. Currently there is a property owned by William N. Reagor that is landlocked and accessed by a driveway on Greenwood Cemetery Road. The City of Paris owns the property where the driveway meets the street.

This request is for an easement for ingress and egress across an existing 20-foot-wide gravel driveway leaving from Greenwood Cemetery Drive southward across the property of the City of Paris. They are also obtaining an easement from Jeffrey and Samantha Barker where most of the driveway exists.

If agreeable to this request the City Commission should make a motion for the Mayor to sign the legal document granting easement for access.

All other portions of Tax Map 96, Parcels 60.00, 62.00 and 63.02 are considered off-limits to the Third Party herein.

It is agreed by the parties hereto that no party shall obstruct said easement or interfere with the rights of ingress and egress herein granted. All upkeep and maintenance of said easement shall be the sole responsibility of the Third Party herein.

To have and to hold the easement rights herein granted to the Second Party, his heirs, assigns, and successors in title to the premises herein benefited, forever.



Updates from the City Manager

• American Rescue Plan – After reviewing the "Interim Rule" issued by the US Treasury, I have become aware that storm water (drainage) projects are included as acceptable uses of the ARP funds. If a project would qualify as an acceptable project under the Clean Water Act then it will qualify for these funds. My thought process, at this point, is to recommend we spend some of our funds to commission a city-wide drainage study. That being said, I am still proceeding with caution as the Final Rule has not yet been issued. I am having conversations with TLM so that when we have a comfort level that this is, in fact, an acceptable use, we can hit the ground running.

Last week the State of Tennessee's Financial Stimulus Accountability Group (FSAG) met and approved Phase One of the "Tennessee Resiliency Plan," which identifies how almost \$2 billion of the \$4 billion in federal ARPA funds allocated to the State are to be utilized. Among other things, the FSAG discussed a program to be offered which will provide ARP technical assistance to local governments. This will include training, education, planning support and advisory review of the annual plans required under the ARPA rule.

• Police Officer Shortage – As of today, we are short 7 patrol officers in our P.D. Two are on light duty, one is on medical leave, one is on an extended National Guard deployment, one is at the Academy, one has been reassigned as a SRO and one submitted their resignation late last week. We have been taking applications for the position of police officer for a few weeks now but have not gotten very many applications. We will be moving forward through the hiring process beginning next week with the administration of the law enforcement test. The plan is to hire two new individuals if we end up with two good candidates. As a result of this shortage officers not assigned to patrol positions (Captains, CID, Asst. Chief, Chief) may have to cover some patrol shifts. It will also mean more overtime than

normal. Right now, morale in the department is good but that could change if the remaining officers become overworked. Chief Watson and Asst. Chief Reed are doing their best to make adjustments and make sure everything is covered.

<u>Paving / Roads</u> – Following you will find the revised paving list for this year. As a reminder, about \$50,000 is reserved each year for misc. patching and repairs. The Harding Road project is not included because the HCSS will be reimbursing us for this project. Paving is scheduled to begin around the end of September, weather permitting.

On another note, Phillip has been able to locate some Clear Lane product in Louisville, KY available for purchase. Clear Lane is a product where salt has been treated with magnesium chloride. It takes less of this product to clear a road, it works in much colder temperatures, and it is much gentler on vehicles and our streets than plain salt. We have used it in the past but because it is in such high demand in the north, it is hard to find. Phillip feels very fortunate to have found some available product and will be sending several trucks to go pick this up.
